

# The International Organization for Migration (IOM)

IOM has provided migrant training for over 60 years. Every year, **40,000** migrants receive IOM's support

- ✓ Canadian Orientation Abroad (15 sites; 13 000)
- ✓ United States Cultural Orientation (21 sites; 18 000)
- ✓ Australian Cultural Orientation (21 sites; 4 000)
- ✓ Norwegian Cultural Orientation (5 sites; 650)
- ✓ UK Cultural Orientation (5 sites; 600)
- ✓ Other programs (Netherlands, Finland, Germany, Japan, etc.)

## **OUTCOMES**

- Adjusting strategies prior to departure (75%)
- Adjusting expectations (75%)
- Feeling prepared for the move (93%)
- Knowing what to do upon arrival (77%)
- Accessing settlement services upon arrival (82%)
- Easing initial settlement (84%)



## **CHALLENGES**

Providing **relevant**, **accurate**, **consistent**, and **timely** information to help newcomers make informed settlement decisions.

**Increased Outreach** 

- Be proactive in determining where PDO is offered
- Better promote services where they are available

Needs Assessments

- Refugees: Information on destinations
- Immigrants: Employment preparation

*Post-arrival connections* 

- Find Gateway Organizations
- Build on the experience of the Settlement Sector
