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FOREWORD

The Peel Newcomer Strategy Group (PNSG)

The Peel Newcomer Strategy Group (PNSG) is a community-based planning group whose primary mandate is to develop a system-wide strategy or model for the successful settlement and integration of new immigrants and refugees in Canada (newcomers to Canada). This report is one component of a research project on the settlement services sector in Peel Region undertaken by PNSG in order to get factual information on the size, scope and geographic distribution of organizations or agencies that provide services for the settlement and integration of newcomers in Peel.

The PNSG Research Project

The PNSG research project on the settlement and integration of newcomers in Peel (of which this report, is only one part) addressed two major questions:

A Meta-Research or Pre- Planning Question - What information does PNSG need in order to develop a system-wide model for the successful settlement and integration of new immigrants and refugees in Peel Region?

A Meta-Capacity Building or Pre-Development Question - What are the organizational characteristics of the agencies/organizations in Peel that are focused specifically on the settlement and integration of newcomers to Canada? (Characteristics related to size and focus or scope of these agencies)

Sample Used for the Research Project

A survey of the above data sources revealed a total of 95 agencies (or organizations) in Peel that are directly focused on newcomers to Canada and ethno-specific groups or offer specific services to newcomers in addition to their regular services. These agencies are organized into two main categories:

- Settlement Agencies (n = 71)
- Mainstream Agencies with specific services for newcomers (n =24)

Settlement agencies are organizations that are focused mainly on serving newcomers to Canada and specific ethnic groups in Canada.

The Settlement Agencies are further organized into four (4) categories:

- Ethno-Specific Service Agencies (n= 27)
- Ethno-Specific Social Clubs (n=20)
- Multi-Ethnic Agencies (n=19)
- Neighbourhood Centres (n=5)

Mainstream agencies are organizations that are focused on serving the general population, including newcomers to Canada and all ethnic groups in Canada. Some of them offer services that are specifically geared to newcomers to Canada in addition to their regular offering of services for the general population.

Deliverables of the Research Project

The research undertaken to address the questions of the project yielded five (5) distinct but related reports:

- A Conceptual Framework for the Research Work of the Peel Newcomer Strategy Group (2010) for the purpose of developing a system-wide model for settlement and integration of newcomers in Peel. This report identifies the key research questions that PNSG should address as part of its activities to achieve its planning objectives.
- An Inventory of Different Types of Settlement Services in Peel (2010). This report provides a database of 95 organizations serving newcomers to Canada and ethno-specific groups in Peel by type of organization (ethno-specific service agency, ethno-specific social club, multi-ethnic agency, neighbourhood centre) and type of visible minority group served.
- An Inventory of Settlement Services in Peel by Postal Code and Neighbourhood Level (2010). This report provides a database on 95 organizations located in 15 different neighbourhoods. This document also identifies the actual number of organizations serving newcomers and refugees in specific postal code areas. (A different version of the above Inventory)
- The Size and Scope of the Settlement Services Sector in Peel (2010). This report provides a quantitative analysis of selected characteristics of agencies serving newcomers in Peel (number of agencies, types of agencies, geographic location, years in existence, charitable status, number of staff, size of Board of Directors, programs and services, gender of Executive Director or President, etc.).
- A Preliminary Analysis of Public Funding for Settlement Service Agencies in Peel (2010). This provides information on the revenue and expenditures of 25 (out of 71) settlement service agencies in Peel in 2004 and 2008. The 25 agencies are registered charitable agencies who report their revenues and expenditures to the Canadian Revenue Agency on an annual basis. (This report is an internal, confidential document for PNSG.)



INTRODUCTION

Background and Rationale for Study

Between 2001 and 2006, Peel's population grew from 988,950 to 1,159,400. This represents a population growth rate of 17.2%. Immigration is the primary factor driving the rapid population growth in Peel. In 2006, immigrants made up 48.6% of Peel's total population. This is significantly higher than the composition of immigrants in Ontario (28.3%) and Canada as a whole (19.8%). In addition, fully half (50%) of Peel's population identify themselves as members of visible minority groups compared to only 22.8% and 16.2% respectively in Ontario and Canada (Canada Census, 2006). As a growing immigrant recipient region, Peel has become richly diverse and vibrant with over 93 distinct ethnic groups, 60 different spoken languages, and several different religions practised by its residents.

This immense ethno-cultural diversity in Peel, which continues to grow, requires an on-going response of culturally appropriate services and increased settlement and integration services for new immigrants. This is critical in order to make Peel Region a welcoming and liveable place for all of its residents, including those who are newcomers to Canada.

The Peel Newcomer Strategy Group (PNSG) is a community-based planning body charged with the objective of developing a system-wide service model to enable the successful settlement and integration of new immigrants and refugees in Peel Region. One of the requirements for achieving this objective is factual information about the existing services for newcomers and immigrant groups in Peel Region.

Purpose of the Study

This study addresses the following research question:

What are the characteristics of the agencies/organizations in Peel that are focused specially on the settlement and integration of newcomers to Canada (size and scope only)?

The report is also targeted at settlement service organizations and charitable organizations in Peel since one of the purposes of this research is to identify service gaps at the regional, municipal and neighbourhood levels that need to be addressed. Researchers in the field of non-profit management, capacity-building and civic engagement may also find this report to be relevant for their work.

I. NUMBER AND TYPE OF ORGANIZATIONS SERVING NEWCOMERS AND ETHNO-SPECIFIC GROUPS IN PEEL

- There are approximately 95 organizations in Peel Region that provide services targeted specifically at newcomers to Canada and ethno-specific groups.
- 71 of the agencies serving newcomers and ethno-specific groups (74.7%) are "settlement agencies" and 24 (25.3%) are "mainstream agencies."
- The 71 settlement agencies in Peel can be classified in the following way:
 - Ethno-Specific Service Agencies (n=27)
 - Ethno-Specific Social Clubs (n=20)
 - Multi-Ethnic Agencies (n=19)
 - Neighbourhood Centres (n=5)
- The mainstream agencies in Peel that provide services specifically targeted at newcomers to Canada tend to be relatively large agencies such as school boards, colleges, libraries, large family counseling agencies, etc.

II. AGE Organizations Serving Newcomers and Ethno-Specific Groups in Peel

Period of Establishment (Number of Years in Existence)

- The organizations serving newcomers in Peel are relatively young. Based on data available from 42 organizations, the average age of establishment is 18 years. Just about 17 agencies (40%) were established between 1981 and 1990; 10 (24%) were established between 1991 and 2000; and 10 (24%) were established between 2001 and 2009.
- The average age of an agency in the settlement services sector in Peel is 17.1 years. Within the Settlement Agencies group, the neighbourhood centres had the highest average age of establishment 27.8 years, followed by the multi-ethnic agencies with an average age of 18.4 years. The most recently established agencies were those in the ethno-specific social clubs category (13.5 years) and the ethno-specific settlement agencies category (14.8 years).
- Among the ethno-specific agencies, the longest established agencies are those serving the Filipino community (average of 27.0 years). They are followed by agencies serving the Chinese community (average of 22.5 years), and then by agencies serving the Arab community (average of 21.5 years). The more recently established agencies are those serving the South East Asian community (average of 4.0 years) and the Hispanic and Italian communities (average of 7.0 years respectively).

III. CHARITABLE STATUS*

Organization Serving Newcomers and Ethno-specific Groups in Peel

An important measure of an agency's organizational capacity is whether it is a registered charity with the Canada Revenue Agency. Many funders of services for the community, especially government funders, usually require agencies to be registered charities in order to provide them with funds, grants, transfer payments, etc.

- Of the 95 agencies serving newcomers and ethno-specific groups in Peel, 40 (42.1%) are registered charities. (This includes both settlement agencies and mainstream agencies.)
- Of the 71 agencies that are "settlement agencies," only 25 (35%) are registered charities.
- The settlement agencies that are registered charities (25) are the ones that provide settlement and related health and social services to newcomers.
- The ethno-specific social clubs in Peel are not registered charities and do not tend to offer formal health and social services to their clientele.
- Of the 27 ethno-specific service agencies, 11 (41%) are registered charities.
- All of the multi-ethnic settlement agencies in Peel (19) are registered charities.
- All of the neighbourhood centres in Peel (5) are registered charities.
- 15 of the 24 mainstream agencies offering specific services to newcomers are registered charities (62.5%).

Age of Registered Charities That Are Providing Services to Newcomer in Peel (n=40)

- The 40 agencies in our sample that are registered charities have had their charitable status for an average of 22.3 years. This means that many, 35% (14 agencies) received their charitable status before 1980. Just under 1/3 (30% or 12 agencies) received their charitable status between 1981 and 1990. Seven (7) agencies (18%) received their charitable status more recently, between 2001 and 2009.
- The Mainstream Agencies group has had their charitable status for almost twice as long as the Settlement Agencies group, 31.9 years versus 16.5 years respectively.
- Within the Settlement Agencies group, the neighbourhood centres have had their charitable status on average for over two decades (averages of 24.8 years), while the multi-ethnic agencies have had their charitable status for an average of 18.4 years. In contrast, the ethnospecific service agencies are the most recent recipients of charitable status, with an average age of 11.2 years.
- Among the ethno-specific agencies, those agencies serving the Chinese community have had their charitable status the longest (average of 23.0 years), followed by the agencies serving the South Asian community (average of 10.5 years), and by agencies serving the Black community (average of 6.2 years). The agencies serving the West Asian community are the most recent recipients of charitable status (average of 2.0 years).

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According to the Canada Revenue Agency, a registered charity is an incorporated non-profit organization established and operated for charitable purposes, and must devote its resources to charitable activities. The charity must be resident in Canada, and cannot use its income to benefit its members. When an incorporated non-profit organization meets these criteria in the eyes of the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA), it is deemed by the latter as a "registered charity."

IV. GOVERNANCE Organizations Serving Newcomers and Ethno-Specific Groups in Peel Region (Registered Charities; N=38)

- Data from 38 agencies with charitable status show the average size of the Boards for Peel agencies serving newcomers to Canada is 10 members.
- As a group, the Settlement Agencies tend to have slightly larger Boards (an average of 10.6 members) than the Mainstream Agencies (9.8 members). Within the Settlement Agencies group, ethno-specific service agencies have the largest Boards, averaging 11.6 members, compared to 10.4 members for the Boards of neighbourhood centres and 9.5 members for the Boards of multi-ethnic settlement agencies.
- Among ethno-specific settlement agencies, the agencies with the largest Boards are those that serve the West Asian community (16.0 members) and the Chinese (14.7 members) community. The agencies that provide services to the Black and South Asian communities have the smallest Boards (8.5 and 11.0 members respectively).

V. HUMAN RESOURCES

Organizations Serving Newcomers and Ethno-Specific Groups in Peel Region

Heads of Agencies/Organizations (Primary Executive) by Gender (N=95)

- Based on data collected for 95 agencies/organizations, more than half, 53.7% of the primary executives of these agencies are male.
- The Mainstream Agencies have more females (54.2%) than males (45.8%) as their Executive Directors and Presidents, compared to the Settlement agencies where 56.3% of the primary executives are males.
- Within the Settlement Agencies group, the neighbourhood centres have more males than females (60% versus 40% respectively) as their primary executives.
- The gender ratio of the primary executives within the ethno-specific settlement service agencies is somewhat balanced, 52% male versus 48% female.
- Similar to the Mainstream Agencies, the gender ratio of the primary executives in the multiethnic agencies significantly favoured women (63.2% versus 36.8% men).
- The agencies serving the Black community were the only group within the ethno-specific category that favoured women, 54.5% versus 45.5% men.
- For most of the other groups within the Ethno-specific category, the gender ratio of the primary executives favoured men.
- Almost 80% of the presidents of the ethno-specific social clubs in Peel are men.

<u>Full-Time and Part-Time Staff (Settlement Agencies/Registerd Charities - N=16 for Full-Time & N=13 for Part-Time)</u>

- The data collected on staff composition showed that, on average, settlement agencies had more full-time staff than part-time staff.
- The neighbourhood centres had the highest number of staff, with an average of 52.6 full-time staff and 35.7 part-time staff per centre.
- The ethno-specific service agencies had an average of 17.8 full-time staff and 2 part-time staff per agency.
- The multi-ethnic agencies had an average of 11.6 full-time staff and 3.8 part-time staff.
- Within the ethno-specific service agencies, the agencies serving the South Asian community had the highest number of full-time staff and the lowest number of part-time staff (an average of 28.0 full-time versus 1.5 part-time staff).
- The agencies serving the Black Community had an average of 7.5 full-time staff and 2.5 part-time staff.

Figure 2 - Settlement Service Agencies by Gender of Executive Director/President (Peel, 2009)






Figure 3 - Ethno-Specific Agencies by Average Size of Full-Time and Part-Time Staff (Peel Region 2009)

VI. SERVICE DELIVERY

Organizations Serving Newcomers and Ethno-Specific Groups in Peel Region

Programs and Services

- 95 agencies: 55 in Mississauga; 25 in Brampton, 2 in Caledon, 12 in Mississauga and Brampton and 1 in Mississauga, Brampton and Caledon.
 - 71 settlement agencies
 - 24 mainstream agencies
 - 123 locations across Peel
 - 18 types of programs and services
 - 345 programs of service offered by settlement agencies
 - Services offered in 60 different languages
- Collectively, the 95 agencies serving newcomers and ethno-specific groups in Peel address
 the needs of those groups through the provision of services in approximately 123 locations
 across the Region.
 - Ethno-Specific Settlement Agencies (n=27)
 - Ethno-Specific Social Clubs (n=20)
 - Multi-Ethnic Agencies (n=19)
 - Neighbourhood Centres (n=5)
 - Mainstream Agencies (n=24)
- These 95 agencies offer a wide range of programs and services that can be broadly grouped as follows: settlement, employment, counseling, cultural/social, language training, referrals, youth/women/seniors-specific, health, and housing.
- The 71 settlement agencies in Peel (part of the above 95) offer 345 programs and services that cover a very wide-range of services that support newcomers to settle and integrate into Canadian society. Several of the service programs are also geared to the promotion of cultural and recreational activities for a range of age-groups.
- Ethno-specific service agencies (as a group) provide the largest number of services to newcomers to Canada:
 - Ethno-specific service agencies: 150 programs (43.5% of the 345 service programs)
 - Multi-ethnic agencies: 108 programs (31.3%)
 - Neighbourhood Centres: 44 programs (12.8%)
 - Ethno-specific Social Clubs: 43 programs (12.5%)
- The majority of the programs offered are for the South Asian community (26.9%) followed by programs for the Black community (21.8%), and by programs for the Chinese community (13%).

Priority Service Areas (Settlement Agencies with Charitable Status)

In their annual report to Canada Revenue Agency, settlement agencies with charitable status listed the following areas of services as their priorities:

- 1. Immigration aid
- 2. Employment preparation and training
- 3. Settlement services
- 4. Seniors services.

Location of Services (123 locations)

- The 95 agencies serving newcomers in Peel provide their services in approximately 123 different service locations across Peel.
- Of the 95 human service agencies/organizations identified in this report, the majority 55 (58%) are located in Mississauga only; 25 (26%) are in Brampton only; and 2 (2%) in Caledon only. Twelve (13%) are located in both Mississauga and Brampton, and 1 (1%) in Mississauga, Brampton, and Caledon.
- Of the 55 agencies/organization located exclusively in Mississauga, 18 (32.7%) are ethnospecific settlement agencies; 14 (25.5%) are ethno-specific social clubs; 13 (23.6%) are multi-ethnic agencies; 8 (14.5%) are mainstream agencies and 2 (3.6%) are neighbourhood centres.
- In Brampton, almost half of the 25 agencies/organizations serving newcomers are mainstream agencies: 11 (44.0%). The ethno-specific social clubs category was the next highest, accounting for 24.0% (6) of the agencies/organizations in Brampton. This was followed by the ethno-specific settlement agencies with 20.0% (5); and by the multi-ethnic settlement agencies with 8.0% (2). There is only one (1) neighbourhood centre in Brampton.
- There are only two agencies/organizations that are located exclusively in Caledon: One (1) mainstream agency and one (1) neighbourhood centre.

CONCLUSIONS

- The settlement services sector in Peel is relatively large at least 71 agencies focused directly on providing services to newcomers in Canada, and 24 mainstream agencies that provide specific services for newcomers to Canada (95 agencies).
- The settlement services sector in Peel is diverse. There are at least five different types of agencies serving newcomers in Peel: ethno-specific settlement service agencies (27); ethno-specific social clubs (20); multi-ethnic settlement service agencies (19); neighbourhood centres (5); and mainstream service agencies (24).
- The settlement services sector in Peel is relatively young. The average age of agencies in the settlement services sector in Peel is 17.1 years.
- The settlement services sector of Peel is a major service provider in Peel. It provides a large number of programs in many different locations, and in many different languages: 345 programs; 123 locations; at least 60 languages.
- The executive leadership of the settlement services sector in Peel is somewhat male dominated sector. This is especially the case among the ethno-specific social clubs where over 87% of the Presidents are male.
- The workforce of settlement service agencies in Peel tends to be of a moderate size: an average of 28 full-time staff and an average of 11.8 part-time staff.
- The capacity of agencies for accessing funds is somewhat limited. Only one third of the settlement service agencies in Peel are registered charities. This limits the sector's capacity for accessing funds from funders who require applicants to be registered charities.
