




Immigration Drives Manitoba's Population Growth



The Manitoba Provincial Nominee Program Drives Immigration


- Over the past 20 years, the MPNP has brought more than 130,000 economic immigrants to our province.
- Almost 90% of economic immigrants arrive in Manitoba through the MPNP.
- Almost twice as many Provincial Nominees choose to settle in rural destinations than those coming through federal economic streams.



MPNP - a Rural Immigration Program from Inception

- 1997 Partnership with regional communities and organizations ("Winkler Initiative" and "Sewing Machine Operators Initiative").
- 1998 Formalized initiatives into a Canada-Manitoba Immigration Agreement.
- 2005 Research coordination e.g.: Rural Development Institute in Brandon.
- 2006 Development of Community Resources including a Community Immigration Planning Portal.
- 2006 Enhanced coordination with other departments and community partners e.g.: Manitoba Agriculture, Municipalities, Economic Development Officers, Chambers of Commerce, School Divisions, and Regional Health Authorities.

- Support through overseas recruitment missions


Attract Rural Business Investment

How the MPNP works with Manitoba Employers

Employer Engagement is a part of Manitoba's Immigration Strategy

• The MPNP:

- Partners with eligible Manitoba employers to recruit and retain skilled immigrant workers;
- Offers international recruitment options to meet employers' human resource needs; and,
- Helps employers retain immigrant workers through the MPNP's Employer Direct Recruitment Pathway.

How the MPNP Supports Rural Immigration through the Business Investor Stream

Two Business Investment Pathways

Entrepreneur Pathway

- Temporary to Permanent Model
- Invited to Apply, Work Permit, establishes business, receives nomination by Manitoba, applies for Permanent Residency

Farm Investor Pathway

- Permanent Model
- Invited to Apply, receives Nomination, applies for Permanent Residency, establishes farm business after becoming Permanent Resident

How the MPNP supports Francophone Immigration

- Community and employer partnerships through strategic initiatives of the MPNP:
 - Société franco-manitobaine (SFM);
 - the Centre de développement économique du Manitoba (CDEM);
 - the World Trade Centre Winnipeg, and
 - the Université Saint-Boniface.
- Exploratory visits for francophone candidates in collaboration with CDEM.
- Promoting youth exchange programs for the purpose of undertaking work placements, internships for both students and professionals, including francophone teachers (ex. Manitoba-Région Basse Normandie in France).
- Participation in Destination Canada events.
