

- Lack of Canadian data and research
- Rapidly changing
- Alberta perspective

## Early warning signs

#### Long term care facilities

- LTC residents accounted for 81% of all reported COVID-19 deaths in Canada
- 840+ outbreaks in LTC facilities (CIHI)

#### **Homelessness**

- Newly homelessness individuals
- Health and safety challenges
- Affordability crisis

#### Incarceration

- 3387 tests completed, 363 positive tests and 2 deaths (CSC)
- "...a quarter of inmates have been infected as a result of the outbreak"

#### **Essential workers**

- Cargill
- Essential agricultural migrant workers facing discrimination and racism





COVID-19 DEATHS PER 100,000 PEOPLE OF EACH GROUP, REPORTED THROUGH MAY 11, 2020





Share of COVID-19 cases among ethno-racial groups compared to the share of people living in Toronto, with valid data up to July 16, 2020 (N=3,861)



### **Actions**

#### **COVID-19 Hate Incident**

#### What is a COVID-19 related Hate Incident?

A noncriminal act motivated in whole or in part by prejudice, bias or hate towards a specific person or identifiable group of persons due to COVID-19.

Simply put, this is when someone does something mean and hurtful because they have a negative feeling towards a section of the public distinguished by colour, race, religion, etc., and that hostility increases and is expressed due to COVID-19.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, hate has been on the rise both online and in person. It is important to understand the ways that hate appears and also recognize that places that people can report to.

#### What can be considered a COVID-19 related Hate Incident?

#### Examples

- · Saying that prisoners deserve to catch COVID-19
- Making anti-Asian comments about COVID-19
- . Sharing anti-Semitic memes or posts about the COVID-19

#### What is COVID-19 related Hate Crime?

This is a criminal offence motivated in whole or in part by prejudice, bias or hate towards a specific person, identifiable group of persons or property due to COVID-19.

In other words, a criminal act that can involve intimidation, harassment, physical force, or threat and that its motive is resentment or a negative opinion for the characteristics of a person because of COVID-19

Overtime, more COVIDspecific resources and strategies were developed and shared widely

## Surveys

Creating a reporting centre for COVID-19

Surveys were used to better understand the current situation & fill gaps in knowledge

71% of respondents thought it was extremely important for them to have COVID-19 information available in their first language

Most common locations were online, on the street, or in a grocery store

85% have seen, heard, or experienced racism and xenophobia related to the COVID-19

### Outcomes

- "It was shocking that Canada is not collecting race-based data on who is being infected... this situation offers an incredible learning opportunity to address inherent discrimination that exists against vulnerable peoples"
