

EVALUATION

• Is an organized approach to collecting information (about activities and impacts) that assesses the accomplishments and effectiveness of a program (or organization) and helps to improve it.





THE DRIVERS OF EVALUATION

REACTIVE


• In response to funder accountability

PROACTIVE

- For healthy organizational development
- For adaptive management in response to shifting contexts

MEANINGFUL EVALUATION

- Not only does evaluation
- But also uses evaluation results







EVALUATION IN DISRUPTIVE TIMES

STRATEGIC LEARNING

- Keeping focused on strategic directions
- Providing opportunity for reflective practice

ADAPTIVE MANAGEMENT

- Real-time evidence to guide decision-makers
- Usefulness in stimulating innovation



MEANINGFUL EVALUATION

- Helps organizations to adapt to the current context
- Keeps organizations focused on their strategic mission



COMMON COVID-19 ADAPTATIONS

EVALUATION FOCUS

- Learnings about how pandemic impacts <u>service delivery</u>
- Learnings about how pandemic impacts intended outcomes

EVALUATION IMPLEMENTATION

- Remote information gathering
- Remote ethical considerations

EVALUATION USE

- Remote knowledge mobilization strategies
- Clarify what program adaptations can be carried forward beyond the pandemic

THREE HALLMARKS OF COMMUNITY-BASED EVALUATION

EVALUATION THAT STRIVES TO BE...

Stakeholder-Driven

Ensure that the evaluation is practically relevant to stakeholders and is driven by the program's unique theory of change

Participatory

Program stakeholders and researchers equitably share control of the evaluation agenda through active and reciprocal involvement in the evaluation design, implementation and dissemination

Action-Oriented

The evaluation process and results are useful to stakeholders in making improvements to the program and contribute to communities where everyone is supported and belongs



THREE GOALS OF COMMUNITY-BASED EVALUATION

Community Mobilization = Facilitation

ÉNGAGING PEOPLE

Building stronger relationships among stakeholders so that they are better equipped to do and use evaluation together

LEARNING TOGETHER

Gaining new insights through systematic and rigorous evaluation research

Knowledge Production = Rigour

SHARING RESULTS

Communicating what has been learned in ways that enable people to use the evaluation results

Knowledge Mobilization = Communication

TWO GENERAL APPROACHES TO EVALUATION



Expert-Based

One person/group has expertise that is prescribed



Community-Based

The collective has different kinds of expertise that is emergent




SUMMARY DEFINITION

"A research approach that involves active participation of stakeholders, those whose lives are affected by the issue being studied, in all phases of research for the purpose of producing useful results to make positive changes."





FEDERAL INITIATIVES IN SUPPORT OF SPOS



Federal Government Context

- Outcomes and results reports has increasingly been an IRCC (and Govt of Canada) priority
- The Settlement and Resettlement Program logic models → a starting point!
 - However, can be adapted, tailored, layered upon
- Look for **alignment** with IRCC outcomes...'see yourself' and situation your program, intervention
- Focus on understanding impacts and client and program/ pilot/ initiative results
 - What is working well, areas for improvement
 - Scalable results / broad applicability
 - Connection to IRCC outcomes and reporting requirements
- For meaningful evaluations, some key principles to carry forward:
 - Objective assessments
 - Robust approaches
 - Reliable data

Evaluating in a COVID Context

- Evaluations and outcomes assessment is even more critical in these pandemic times
 - Heightened value of evidence, baselines, performance data
- Service delivery, client interaction, reach, etc. may have changed...but the need demonstrate results has not!
- Evaluating in a COVID setting requires adjustments:
 - In scope, timing, methodologies, expectations
 - Communicate the challenges with stakeholders, partners, funders
 - Key evaluation principles still apply
- Transparent reporting, recognize gaps
- Using virtual means to connect with respondents, client populations, more reliance on existing and administrative data




SUCCESSFUL PARTNERSHIPS

- Strategic for both parties mutual benefits
 - -Pool resources in innovative ways
- View evaluation through a different, but complementary lens
- Inclusive approach to evaluation
- Equal partners

SHARED VALUES

Does the researcher share and respect your organization's values and norms?



RIGOUR

Is the quality of the methodology and analytic plan rigourous?



KNOWLEDGE MOBILIZATION

How will the findings be moved into action? What does the future of the partnership look like?





HOW WE STARTED

- Agreed community-based approach is clear, aligns with our values
- Rather than trying to build a whole framework and then start evaluating, chose to begin parallel process
- Selected IRCC-SDI project with evaluation due soon as our pilot
- Created two parallel committees:
 - advisory committee oversees whole framework development
 - steering committee for first pilot project

FRAMEWORK ADVISORY WORKING GROUP

- Develop a framework and multi-year plan
- Develop an organizational logic model, link with project logic models
- Track what we learn from evaluations
- Gather high level data across the organization
- Collect and develop resources and tools
- Map and strengthen the links between evaluation, outcomes measurement, reporting and program and service development in line with the ISANS strategic plan



PROJECT STEERING COMMITTEES

Develop an evaluation plan for specific areas of ISANS' work and to guide the evaluation process in those areas.

Plan and implement the four steps of the community-based approach:

Laying the foundation

Evaluation planning

Information gathering and analysis

Acting on findings



ADVANTAGES OF APPROACH

- Incremental, therefore manageable
- Flexible, can incorporate other initiatives along the way
- Engages many different colleagues across the organization



EVALUATION IN A DISRUPTIVE TIME

- Spent much time on COVID adaptations
- Found limits to virtual engagement of clients and partners
- Process was slow, but continued
- Spent time clarifying, agreeing on implementation plan
