

Participants are paid a small honorarium for their time



Living Library – COVID hits!!



Pre-COVID: 22 engagements in one year

Less demand and capacity for virtual visits in the initial months of the pandemic

- Podcast Series (1000+ listens)
 - Season 1 (2020) 7 episodes
 - Season 2 (2021) 5 episodes
- Video Series (10 videos)

Living Library - How



- 1. Start small recruit 3 to 5 speakers
- 2. Offer Training partner for groups like the Toastmasters Club to offer public speaking training
- Support Speakers with Story Development. Gather bios, headshots, story title
- 4. Promote. Bookings through program lead.
- 5. Refresh speakers. (Initially every 5 months. Now yearly)
- 6. Grow from here. Explore avenues like radio, video, etc.

Living Library - Outcomes



Majority of speakers have Intermediate English

- **Experiential Opportunity**
- Participants learn new vocabulary through conversations

Opportunity to be seen & heard.

For many, it is the first time public speaking

Opportunity for community to learn and challenge

stereotypes

Partnership with Trent Radio – CFFF 92.7FM Facilitated entirely virtually via Zoom

Goal: to support newcomers with skills and opportunities to tell their stories on their own terms and diversify voices and perspectives in local media and arts.

Each participant was provided with audio gear including a professional recorder and headphones. These were theirs to keep.


In-person


