#93 – Calls for a more inclusive history of diverse Indigenous Peoples of Canada in settlement education and the Canadian citizenship test, including information about Treaties and the history of residential schools.

#94 - Calls for an update to the citizenship oath to include the acknowledgment of Indigenous presence regarding the existence of Treaties.

National Needs Assessment

- Regional focus groups with front-line practitioners across Canada to explore lived experiences, cultural perspectives, and community-level challenges related to TRC engagement in settlement and integration work.
- Focus groups complete in BC, Alberta, Saskatchewan/Manitoba, Ontario (2), and Atlantic region with Quebec to come.
- To be followed by national online survey and in-depth interviews with sector leaders and Indigenous people working in the settlement sector
- Needs assessment with broader Indigenous community pending guidance from Indigenous Advisory Council
